I have carried out many roles in the group, and finally moved on to District roles, carrying out the role of ADC Cubs for Plymouth North.

I then moved to Plympton and Ivybridge as District Explorer Scout Commissioner. When the new Plymouth District started, I was invited to return and was offered two roles – one, of District Explorer Scout Commissioner, or the ADC Cubs. I chose the Cubs and carried out the role until I decided to step back. I still remained in Scouting on the District Executive Committee, and I'm still there. It was only last year, when I accompanied my grandson to 1st Crownhill's AGM, that I heard Rachel's request for someone to step into the role of Chairman and offered my services.

So - what have we done since? Listening to some of the Leaders, who I have known for many years, we established a way forward for the Group. One of the main things that they would like was a new modern, up-to-date projector. This was duly sourced from Richer Sounds in Plymouth, who let us have a £1,000 projector for a mere £350. We thank them for their support with this.

After having the new kitchen fitted, it was found that the Central Heating boiler was beyond repair, and needed replacing. I used my contacts

to source a boiler free of charge from Plumbase Ltd and managed to coerce an installer friend - Mark Conday - to install the said boiler for free. We thank both for their very kind gesture and who knows how much it has saved the Group.

In attending the Group camp it was also clear that the barbecue being used was not efficient and somewhat unsafe to use. It was agreed that, as the barbecue is used a great deal for many fundraising activities, it would be replaced. Hopefully, this will be put to good use at the fundraising Field Gun event on 10th June.

As you can see, I have been very busy in the few months of my Chairmanship. Not one to rest on my laurels, I have one or two ideas for fundraising which I hope to put into practice with your support. More details will be available once I have had a meeting with all concerned.

As you can all appreciate, fundraising is an important part in keeping the Group running as it cannot survive on subs alone. Hopefully your support will continue throughout the next year.

Finally, it would be remiss of me not to mention the support of the Leaders and I am sure their reports will contain all the activities, events and fun that the young members have had. Also, I must mention the work that Rachel does in keeping the Group together. I am sure our working partnership will continue to head in the right direction for the benefit of the Group.

## Scout Section Report

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In the report for last year the number within the Scout Section was approximately 18 and as a result of Cub Scouts moving up to the Scout Section and several Scouts from other Troops and also non-members joining the current number is 30. Cubs continue to join and most of those that reach 14 or 14 ½ move on to join the Explorer Scouts.

2016/2017 saw many of the Tuesday night activities and badge-work sessions revolving around the Creative and Teamwork Challenges and also the Navigator and Survival Skills Activity Badges. As a result of all this work 9 Creative and 15 Teamwork Challenge Awards were gained along with 10 Survival Skills badges. Other badges gained included the following Challenge Awards; 3 Outdoors, 3 Skills, 1 Personal, 3 Team Leader and 20 Adventure.

Due to the various camps held it was possible to award 37 Nights Away badges; 3 ones, 5 twos, 4 threes, 8 fives, 10 tens, 4 fifteens, 1 thirty-five and 2 fifties. Other Activity Badges gained were 1 Hike Away One, 1 Hike Away Five, 7 Emergency Aid One, 2 Emergency Aid two, 4 Emergency Aid Three, 2 Martial Arts and one each of Fire Safety, Model Maker, D.I.Y., Sports Enthusiast, Physical Recreation, Time On The Water One and Paddle Sports One. As part of ongoing attendance and participation in activities 26 Joining In Awards were issued. A grand total of 151 badges were awarded, which is an increase of 26 from last year.

There were three camps held during the year – Woodlands in September, Survival Skills in March and Group Camp in April/May.

Woodlands is the annual County Camp held at the Woodlands Theme Park and was well attended with the Scouts enjoying the full range of the activities available at the Park as well as some put on by the various Scout Groups.

The Survival Skills Camp in March at Shaugh was attended by 10 Scouts and was the culmination of all the training and activity sessions on Tuesdays where they learnt many of the skills needed to survive in the wild. At the camp the Scouts built, lit and cooked on open fires, took part in a number of Wide Games, built shelters, did some shooting and had a great time and lots of fun. Throughout Saturday the Scouts

built shelters/bivouacs with the intention of sleeping in them overnight. However, due to the weather being rather cold only 2 of the Scouts remained in the shelters overnight and they were the two girls. Well done Sophia and Latoya. Those who attended the camp generated a lot of enthusiasm amongst those that did not and it is intended to run another Camp before the Summer Holidays and making the awarding of more Nights Away badges and also Survival Skills Activity Badges as well.

The Group Camp over the May Day Bank Holiday Weekend in April/May was well attended by 20 Scouts who took part in numerous activities and all came away with the Adventure Challenge Award plus other bits and pieces signed off on other badges. A full report of this camp is written elsewhere in the AGM Reports.

By the Summer Holidays many of the Scouts will have completed the Navigator One Activity Badge and also more of the Challenge Awards.

The St. George's Day Parade was held on the 23rd April and was different this year as it was held at Home Park and there were a number of activities for the members to have a go at before the Service and Promise. It was well attended by the Scout section and all the Scouts thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

Well done to all the Scouts for all their achievements and for their enthusiasm and dedication.

A big thank you to the Scout Section Leaders {Simon, Jason & Steve} for their time and effort in putting together and running a successful programme and to all the others who have assisted in any way.

Special thanks to Rob from the Explorer Unit with his continued assistance on a regular weekly basis, to Megan, Latoya and Max with their help as part of the leadership team for several months before moving on. Also thanks to Dave and Philippe for all the help they provided either in their spare time or as a rest from their studies at University. As always a special thank you to Jill for her continued excellent and still often 'headache creating' work as Troop Treasurer.

## Treasurer's Report

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The Total Income was £13,413.05 and the Total Expenditure was £12,414.65 with an excess expenditure for the year of £998.40.

The income was up £1,960, but this is mainly due to increased activities and fundraising (up £1,205 mainly due to the firework nights). We also had a grant for £1,500 to cover the kitchen refurbishment. The main area for concern is the reduced subs, mainly in the beaver section.

Expenditure was down £446 overall, but if you exclude the Electrical rewire (£4000 last year) Kitchen Refurb (£1,941 this year) the overall expenditure was up £1,6123, but this is mainly due to increase Activities

(£555) and Capital Equipment (£538)

Gift Aid 'Sign-up' is strong with over £2,188 being reclaimed from the Inland Revenue.

We have had a problem this year with the lack of documentation being kept by the Beavers section, but I will look after their subs for a short while.

I would like to thank Chris Green, Lynsey O'Brian and Jill Caskey who do a fantastic job taking care of the section accounts.
